There are moments when the world flinches.
Not because something unknown happens,

A THESIS ONE IS BARELY ALLOWED TO VOICE

Nations dressing self-interest up as “national interest,” and pressure as “negotiation,” has been part of the machinery of power for centuries.

None of this is new.

What *is* new is that someone **no longer disguises it, but lives it openly—on camera.**

THE STYLE IS NEW. THE SUBSTANCE IS OLD.

Trump unsettles not because he is “different,” but because he shows how things have **always** worked—this time without a curtain.

He speaks like someone who never learned that power is expected to appear polite, even when it acts without restraint.

Many of his predecessors did the same things behind the scenes, but in tailored suits, with measured language and the vocabulary of diplomacy.

Trump is like someone turning on the lights in the engine room. Suddenly we see the gears, the grease, the manual interventions that usually remain in the dark.

And that is what makes us recoil.





WE ARE NOT SHOCKED BY TRUMP.

We are shocked by ourselves.

We are startled by the possibility

only invisibly.

We suddenly realize how much of politics is theater.
How dependent it is on roles rather than character.
How deeply systems are designed for self-preservation,

WHY THIS BECOMES VISIBLE NOW
